ABOUT US

<u>CEPIA</u> is a non-governmental, non-profit organization, founded in 1990, which completed 32 years of existence acting for women's rights in Brazil.

It promotes the strengthening of human rights and the exercise of citizenship, especially among the most excluded groups, such as women in their diversity, adolescents, and youth in vulnerable situations. All of its projects are developed with a focus on the intersectionality of gender, race and ethnicity, and social class, so as to include the diversity of women and young people and their distinct experiences, needs, vulnerabilities, and potentialities.

Since its foundation CEPIA has developed partnerships with governmental bodies, academic institutions, organizations, and social movements to strengthen and expand its work, which is done through two major lines of action that complement each other: Human Rights, Access to Justice and Violence Against Women and Human Rights, Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights. Both programs invest in empowerment and human rights training for women, adolescents, and youth. The programs aim to share knowledge and skills for the promotion and defense of human, social, sexual and reproductive rights and gender equality.

The programs also include the capacity building of managers, health agents, and justice operators to influence public policies, responding to the continuous learning needs of leaders of organizations and social movements, youth collectives, students, as well as professionals who play a role in the formulation and development of public policies.

MISSION

To strengthen democracy, promoting the enforcement of human rights, social justice, gender equality, race and ethnicity, and the strengthening of citizenship, especially for women and those who, historically, have been excluded from the full exercise of rights.

VISION

A democratic society, with social justice, equity, solidarity, without discrimination of gender, race/ethnicity, and social class and other forms of exclusion.




CEPIA also produces and assembles a collection of publications, manuals, and audiovisual content that subsidizes educational activities and produces and disseminates knowledge on these themes, contributing to the instrumentalization of education and health professionals in their dialogue with youth and adolescents. These materials are also used in peer-to-peer training in workshops and seminars.

CEPIA has a multidisciplinary team, which includes a youth team, and its communication sector has carried out extensive online production, working with a horizontal approach that promotes a democratic and participatory institutional environment, involving youth in program development.

In the scope of its programs, **CEPIA** conducts research and capacity building activities that also reach participants from other countries in Latin America and Lusophone Africa, prioritizing active methodologies and peer-to-peer training. CEPIA invests in digital technologies such as the app Partiu Papo Reto, in the production of audio visual materials, investment in the social media <u>@cepiacidadania</u> and <u>@partiu.papo.reto</u>, to raise awareness among youth using tools widely used by them.







HUMAN RIGHTS, ACCESS TO JUSTICE AND VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Violence against women is a complex, multidimensional, universal phenomenon. Race and ethnicity, social class, sexual identity, and other conditions increase the degree of vulnerability of women in situations of violence. This program includes the capacity building of professionals in the areas of security, justice, social assistance, health and education, public policy managers, women's organizations and movements; advocacy actions for laws and public policies and for access to justice; monitoring the effectiveness of the Maria da Penha Law and the Feminicide Law; research; production and dissemination of knowledge and information in social networks and in the press. It also includes participation in commissions and national and international forums focused on the struggle against gender violence.

With this program, **CEPIA** has established partnerships and articulations with feminist movements and organizations, with justice and security institutions, universities, and networks of attention to women in situations of violence. In this program **CEPIA** has established partnerships and articulations with national and international feminist organizations and consortiums, with the Rio de Janeiro State School of Magistracy - EMERJ, integrating the Women's Safety Commission (CEDIM) and the Domestic and Gender Violence Forum (EMERJ).

HUMAN RIGHTS, SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS

The right to sexual and reproductive autonomy implies deciding freely whether or not to have children, when and how many. It also implies living out sexuality without violence or coercion. This program is developed on different fronts: advocacy actions with society and the State, including amicus curiae before the Supreme Court; capacity building and consciousness raising for different audiences, such as communicators, health professionals, adolescents, and adult women; campaigns on sexual and reproductive rights. It also acts for the social decriminalization of the right to abortion and for the attention in health services to victims of sexual violence.

With this program **CEPIA** has established partnerships and articulations with UN Women and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), as well as with the academic area, with medical associations, with national and international networks. **CEPIA** is also part of the Maternal Mortality Committee of Rio de Janeiro and collaborates with the Health Secretariat's Health RAP, focused on the health of adolescents and youth.

Both programs aim to share knowledge and skills to promote and defend the rights of women, adolescents and youth, and to build common agendas. They respond to the continuous capacity building needs of leaders of organizations and social movements, youth collectives, students, as well as professionals who play a role in the formulation and development of public policies.

CEPIA'S INSTITUTIONAL POLICY ON THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN, ADOLESCENTS AND YOUTH

CEPIA understands that the implementation of an Institutional Policy for the Protection of Children, Adolescents and Youth is a priority to support its actions and institutional conduct. We comply with national and international guidelines regarding activities with children and adolescents and we guide our staff to act in a manner consistent with standards of conduct. The purpose of our Policy is to ensure that all those related to the institution know, understand and respect the laws and the rights of children and adolescents, understand the importance of child, adolescent and youth protection issues, enable the minimization of risks and harm, recognize what represents a violation of their rights, and are aware and clear of the measures to be taken and the reporting mechanisms when any suspicion of violation of these rights arises. Everyone should be aware of their responsibilities and should always ensure compliance with legal and policy-related obligations within and outside their working environment.

BRAZILIAN CONTEXT

The social and economic political context of 2022 was marked by the expansion of poverty, unemployment, the advance of the extreme right wing articulated to evangelical religious players who supported the Bolsonaro government, leading to the spread of hate speech, permission to buy weapons and the dismantling of public policies, among other serious effects.

The health system faced a serious crisis due to low budget investments, the government's denialist policy of refusing to purchase vaccines, and the impacts of the Covid-19 epidemic, resulting in a significant increase in maternal mortality, especially among low-income and black women, the dismantling of legal abortion services, and a drop in vaccination coverage. In 2022 there was also an increase in feminicides, in part derived from the spread of discourses that foment an armed, toxic and violent masculinity and from the dismantling of programs and services to attend to women victims of violence.



This negative and adverse scenario brought a great challenge to civil society movements and organizations, especially women's organizations, to respond with strategic vision, capacity of articulation and social mobilization to the great challenge of preventing setbacks, resisting and maintaining their agendas directed at the defense and advancement of human rights, secular education, overcoming gender, race/ethnicity and sexual orientation discrimination, defending LGBTQ+ rights, indigenous peoples, the environment and confronting gender violence. Civil society organizations lobbied the Supreme Federal Court (STF), a fundamental State institution that guaranteed democracy in this period, as well as allied sectors of the National Congress. They also engaged in dialogue with the press and were strongly active in the social networks and in investing in national articulation strategies.

The year 2022 was also marked by electoral battles for state governors, state and federal deputies and president of the Republic. The electoral victory of the democratic forces, articulated in a broad field of alliances and the election of President Luís Inácio Lula da Silva marked the new context for 2023.

This important but also fragile electoral victory has been attacked by extreme right-wing political forces that have turned against the results of the elections. Thus, for the beginning of 2023, old and new challenges are presented for the defense of the democratic state and for the capacity of institutions and civil society to stop the protagonism of the extreme right.

There is great expectation that the new Brazilian government will expand dialogue with social movements, especially women's movements, incorporating human rights agendas and a whole set of international directives into its policies, such as the Sustainable Development Goals.

On the other hand, the increase in conservative forces in the legislative branch continued in the 2022 elections, both at the national level and in the states and municipalities, especially the representation of religious conservative groups identified with anti-democratic agendas.

In this sense, the feminist agenda becomes more and more ample, focused on stopping bills that totally criminalize the voluntary interruption of pregnancy, even in the three cases already allowed by law, developing advocacy actions for public policies to reduce poverty and historical discriminations, especially against black, indigenous, poor, and young women, press institutions to prevent violence against women, demand the fulfillment of UN Agenda 2030, defend reproductive justice and environmental justice, strengthen articulations in defense of rights are some of the themes of this long agenda.

Throughout 2022, CEPIA expanded its efforts to strengthen its programs and actions in defense of democracy and human rights, especially the human rights of women on different fronts: advocacy with the State and civil society, maintenance of actions to resist setbacks, struggle to advance the human rights agenda; continuity of training, capacity building and qualification actions in human rights for broad sectors with a gender and ethnoracial perspective; maintenance and expansion of its articulation with national and international women's movements and organizations; diverse initiatives with women and youth from popular sectors; maintenance and expansion of dialogues with the mainstream and social media; action with the Supreme Court (STF) in defense of the secular state and of a plural and secular education in schools, strengthening of its communication area, which proved to be a strategic tool in the investment and strengthening of its institutional capabilities.


INSTRUMENTS AND STRATEGIES FOR MONITORING AND EVALUATION: HANDBOOK BY LIFE CYCLES

WOMEN'S POLITICAL PARTICIPATION AND POLITICAL VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

POLITICAL TRAINING AND CAPACITY BUILDING MEETINGS FOR WOMEN: EXPERIENCES, RESISTANCES AND ACTION STRATEGIES



This publication is the result of 4 days of meetings, which took place in October 2021, with the support of UNFPA and WLP, and the participation of women from Brazil and Lusophone Africa, as well as experts onthe theme of women's political participation and gender political violence against women, from social movements, from the justice system and from political mandates.

With us were Thais Ferreira, Malu Heilborn, Tainá de Paula, Ligia Fabris, Silvana Batini, Simony dos Anjos, Rosalina Nhanchote Barbara Libório, and Janaína Costa, as well as CEPIA's team. These women brought their experiences as women in politics, with the objective of sharing with other women, of jointly produce knowledge and debate about strategies for the promotion and implementation of women's human rights, especially in the political field, achieving true gender equality and parity.





GOVERNANCE

According to **CEPIA's Statute**, its governance is composed of a Members' Assembly, made up of civil society members of recognised legitimacy, and a Board of Directors. **CEPIA's** governance body is diverse and plural, a heritage of the fundamental democratic principles that guide the institution. The Executive Coordination is appointed by these instances of the institution, for a renewable mandate of three years. It also has a Financial Committee.

CEPIA also works with an independent accountability firm and its balance sheet is audited by an independent audit firm and reviewed by its Financial Committee.
